Ireland

Ireland is typically considered the birthplace of Halloween. Its origins stem from an ancient festival called Samhain, which celebrated the beginning of winter. Today, Ireland and Scotland celebrate Halloween with trick-or-treating, bonfires, games and traditional foods such as barnbrack, an Irish fruitcake.

Mexico

Halloween in Mexico acts as a primer for another celebration, Día de los Muertos, or Day of the Dead. From Nov. 1 to Nov. 2, Mexico honors those who have passed away. It is believed the gates of heaven open, allowing deceased loved ones to be reunited with their families for 24 hours. Family members prepare the deceased's favorite foods and leave gifts on their graves.

Italy

On Nov. 1, Italians celebrate Ognissanti, or All Saints' Day. In Sardinia, children go door to door to ask for offerings from the deceased. In Abruzzo candles are placed in pumpkins to make lanterns, and in Sicily it is believed deceased loved ones bring gifts to well-behaved children.

Portugal

Day of the Witches or Dia Das Bruxas is the equivalent of Halloween in Portugal. Children go trick-or-treating, but instead of receiving candy, they ask for bread, fruit or nuts. Families also visit their loved ones' graves and leave flowers and candles.
